Humphrey Institute at the University of Minnesota, culminating in the achievement of my M.A. in 1987. The experiences from my days as the only full-time staff member, handling everything from raising support

> to running Club operations, has given me a real understanding of the work needed at every level, strengthening my dedication to the Boys & Girls Clubs' mission of changing lives and securing a better future for the youth we serve.


In spring 2021, we joined the Jeep Beach kick-off at Tanger Outlet for a special event. There, I unexpectedly encountered Justin Blankenship, the Youth of the Year from the Rossmeyer Family/Holly Hill Club in 2008. Having served admirably in the Marine Corps, he now serves as the Rossmeyer Holly Hill Club Director, illustrating

the enduring impact of our programs. The encounter was a powerful reminder of the transformational journeys our Club members embark upon.

Yvette Roman, an original Club member and Junior Staff, returned in 2018. Her commitment to our cause goes beyond a job; it's a calling rooted in her own experiences. Yvette, once the Youth of the Year and a dedicated staff member until 2008, took a different career path. Engaging with the Boys & Girls Club nearly a decade ago during my Hilton tenure, our involvement began with hosting the Steak & Steak event (now named *Celebrate the Children*), a significant fundraising event. The John H. Dickerson Club, adopted by our hotel management as a Facility Friend, prompted quarterly group volunteer efforts for cleaning and maintenance due to the absence of custodial staff. Relying on community and in-kind support, our Club strives to operate seamlessly.

During one volunteer session, we, alongside staff and older kids, painted the hallways of the John H. Dickerson Center, originally Campbell High School, a segregated institution until 1969. Former

principal John H. Dickerson's advocacy led to its transformation into a community center, embodying our mission. Other Club sites, strategically positioned, offer safe spaces in areas of utmost need, including a Methodist Church in Edgewater, upcoming portables in New Smyrna Beach, school sites in Pierson and Palm Coast, a former school cafetorium in Holly Hill, and community centers in Deltona and Lake Helen.

Operating Monday through Friday, our nine Boys & Girls Clubs extend hours during summer and school release days, providing affordable memberships with inclusive meals. Evolving from casual hangouts, our focus shifted to Academic Assistance, Character & Leadership Development, and Healthy Lifestyles, aligning with our mission of youth development.

Leadership strength is pivotal. In 2023, business and community leaders raised nearly \$1,516,663, facilitated by our Board members with extensive public and private sector connections. Collaborations with government staff at various levels provide crucial financial support.

From our inception, we championed creating the next generation of citizens and leaders. Serving as President has been an honor, and I am confident that our next leader, Jaime Bracero, an esteemed Club Alumni will guide us to new successes in the coming year.

money, it's about empowering them with the tools to build a secure and successful future. Together, we're making a lasting impact on the financial well-being of our Club kids.

Project Learn enhances academic enrichment at the Club, building on the success of our signature PowerHour homework help program. By infusing high-yield learning activities with fun, we take homework help to the next level. Partnerships, like the one with Panda Express for the Center of Hope at our Spring Hill Club in DeLand, elevate our academic programs. Kids love the renovated space, finding it motivational and creating a positive learning environment. Through Project Learn, we're making education enjoyable, fostering a love for learning, and ensuring our Club members thrive academically.

Reviving our **Sports and Recreation** programs post-COVID was more than a goal; it was about instilling a love for physical activity and teamwork in our

Club kids. Buffalo Wild Wings played a crucial role in making this happen. Their generous support brought back our AMV Football tournament at the Sperling complex in DeLand, where kids dedicated months to preparation, showcasing their skills and having a great time. The excitement heightened with girls cheering on players creating unforgettable memories.






Building Great Futures

Off the Streets and on the Beat

How Law Enforcement is Making an Impact with Club Kids

Javon's journey is a testament to the transformative power of resilience and mentorship, challenging the notion that circumstances dictate one's future. Raised in an economically disadvantaged neighborhood, Javon defied the odds by seeking a different path from the statistics that often define communities like his.

Finding solace and guidance at the Lacey Family/Spring Hill Club in DeLand, Javon discovered a supportive haven that would alter the course of his life. Initially grappling with challenges, Javon

immersed himself in Club programs, notably the Keystone Club, and engaged in sports, such as the annual AMV flag football tournament. These experiences became catalysts for positive change, redirecting Javon toward a brighter future.

Motivated by the nurturing atmosphere of the Club, Javon drew inspiration from impactful events like the *Kick for a Cure* kickball game. Through this, he formed connections with the City of DeLand Police Department and the Volusia County Sheriff's Office. Fueled by these interactions, Javon pursued his dream of becoming a police officer, recently celebrating his first year of service.

Kenny's story intertwines with Javon's, showcasing the continuity of mentorship at the Boys & Girls Club. Like Javon, Kenny actively participated in Club programs, transitioning from a Club member to Junior staff. Currently a freshman at Daytona State College, Kenny works part-time as a youth development professional, embodying the transformative journey nurtured by the Boys & Girls Club.

Kenny's accolades include being named Youth of the Year, graduating high school in 2023, and earning a full-ride scholarship sponsored by Jeep Beach and Daytona State College. Studying Criminal Justice, Kenny aspires to follow in Javon's footsteps by becoming a police officer and is planning on attending the police academy next year.

Domani, another youth from the Spring Hill community, draws inspiration from Kenny and the numerous examples of law enforcement engagement facilitated by the Boys & Girls Club. The Club's robust partnership with the Volusia County Sheriff's Office began with Ben Johnson and continues today with Sheriff Mike Chitwood.

Javon's role as a mentor to Kenny and Damoni transcends program boundaries, creating a sense of community and shared aspirations within the Club. Their collective journey reflects how Boys & Girls Clubs, community leaders, and law enforcement collaboratively contribute to building a legacy of success. It emphasizes that when a village unites to provide mentorship, extracurricular activities, and opportunities, the impact resonates not only on individual lives but throughout the entire community.

Panda Center of Hope

Boys & Girls Clubs of America and Panda Express are proud to bring a Panda Cares Center of Hope to Spring Hill. Panda Cares Center of Hope is a newly renovated space within our Club designed to deliver more joy, education, and critical social-emotional development to local communities. Our Panda Cares Center of Hope was designed to meet the needs of our Club members and includes new laptops, comfortable furniture, individual workstations, and spaces for them to learn, engage, and grow.

Althea Ross-Chavers "The Beautiful" Teen Center Project

We're thrilled to share a fantastic update on our Althea Ross-Chavers "The Beautiful" Teen Center project—a journey you've all been an essential part of. Thanks to your incredible support, we've secured an impressive \$448,000 in funding. And here's the big news—the Volusia County Board of County Commissioners has approved a substantial \$573,000 CDBG grant, getting us even closer to our \$1,100,000 goal, just \$79,000 more and we'll be "bringing down the house!" In addition, our impact has grown, serving more kids—up from 1300 to 1600 with our teen population surging by twenty-five percent! Let's keep the momentum going!

Oretha Bell/New Smyrna Beach

Fifteen years ago, in partnership with the City of New Smyrna, we converted a former fire station into the Oretha Bell/New Smyrna Beach Club, honoring the legacy of Ms. Oretha Bell, a former Vice-Mayor, librarian, Club Board Member, and "Rosie the Riveter." Her compassionate leadership continues to impact youth and the community. In 2022, Hurricane Ian and Nicole led

to the temporary displacement of our Club, with kids finding refuge at the Jeep Beach/Edgewater Club. Grateful for community support, we're now working on establishing a new temporary location near Babe James Center, utilizing portables donated by Volusia County schools at Pleasant Grove Missionary Baptist Church. Special thanks to Pastor Kenneth Harley, Co-Pastor Neal Coates, and the \$25,000 donation from Fun Coast Foundation for jumpstarting this project. While navigating challenges such as necessary architectural drawings and special permits, we remain optimistic about reopening soon. Stay tuned for updates and thank you for your generous support.


